# Perspectives in Cocoa Production & Child Labor in Côte d'Ivoire

#### **Lesson Overview:**

Child labor, like most social justice issues, is a complicated and controversial issue. To fully understand the issue, one must understand the perspectives of those involved. The following lesson ideas are intended to give students an introduction to these perspectives through a number of different means, including discussion, debate, research, and composition. On the following page is a list of resources that may be useful in the lesson.

#### **Lesson Ideas**

- 1. Class Discussion Give students a selection of each perspective. As a class, analyze the statements made by each side. Highlight key point in each's perspective (i.e. What facts were included? What facts were intentionally/unintentionally left out? What statements are deceptive? What statements are completely false?) Discuss each side's motivation and make conjectures as to the reasoning behind the statements made and left out.
- 2. Debate Assign groups of students a pro/con child labor position. Have them read the resources included and prepare arguments supporting their position. Resources can be divided based on the perspective or made available to both sides. Set a date for students to debate the issue and invite a panel of impartial judges (e.g. students/ teachers/community members) to determine the side with the stronger arguments.
- 3. Research Give groups of students selections from each perspective. Have each group compare and contrast the statements made from each side. For each difference found, have students research the point on the internet and check the validity of each statement.
- 4. Composition Compile a list of facts (as unbiased as possible) from the resources above. Discuss the facts with the class and randomly assign students a perspective (Chocolate manufacturer, child-labor activist, newspaper, cocoa farmer). Have students construct a document (press release, newspaper article, interview, editorial) from that perspective by selecting relevant facts that support their

position. Compare finished perspective papers with actual documents from that perspective.
